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UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT BURSARY

Established by the Department of Education and Skills, the 1916 Bursary Fund aims to encourage the participation and success of students most socio-economically disadvantaged from within groups significantly under-represented in higher education. The 1916 Bursary Fund provides an annual €5,000 bursary to successful applicants for the duration of their undergraduate studies.

Who is it for?

To be considered applicants must: be entering higher education for the first time in 2020/2021; experience socio-economic disadvantage **and** belong to **at least one** of the following target groups:

- Socio-economic groups with low participation in higher education
- Socio-economically disadvantaged area
- Student with a disability
- Lone parent with a DEASP means-tested payment
- Irish Traveller
- First time, mature student entrant
- QQI Further Education award entrants
- Ethnic minorities lawfully present in the State.

What is the value of a 1916 Bursary?

Each student awarded the 1916 Bursary Fund will receive a bursary of **€5,000** per year for the normal duration of a full-time undergraduate programme or up to six years for a part-time students.

What colleges are included in the South Cluster SOAR Project

- Cork Institute of Technology
- Institute of Technology Carlow
- Institute of Technology Tralee
- University College Cork
- Waterford Institute of Technology.

The Cluster will award 35 bursaries in 2020/2021.
