Our BT Young Scientist Experience By Ciara O'Donoghue

At the beginning of the year, all the TYs were given a chance to enter a project into the B' Young Scientist Exhibition in the hopes of reaching the finals in Dublin. I am in TY3 and entered a project with Ellen Godfrey. I was delighted and surprised when I found out that our project had got through, along with another project from our class. Our project title was Our Plastic Problem. Our project is based on plastic pollution on the coasts of the Shannon Estuary and on coasts around Ireland. We wanted to find out how bad the issue of plastic pollution was. We also wanted to help find a solution to it by raising awareness about biodegradable plastics. The other project which qualified for the finals was done by Eamon O Connor, Oisín Prendiville Browne and Ciarán Mulvihill who are all in TY3 also. Their project title was an investigation into the economic advantages of employing a plastic reformer to reform plastic waste into sustainable farm products.
